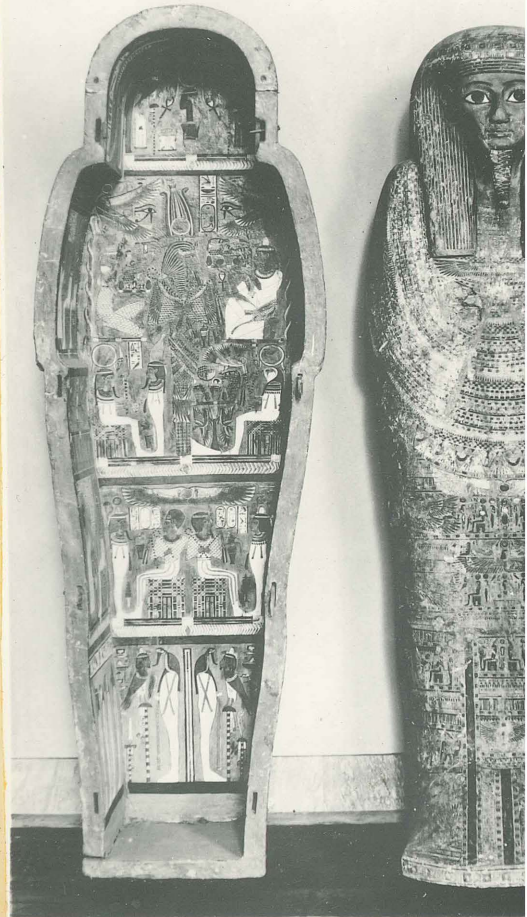

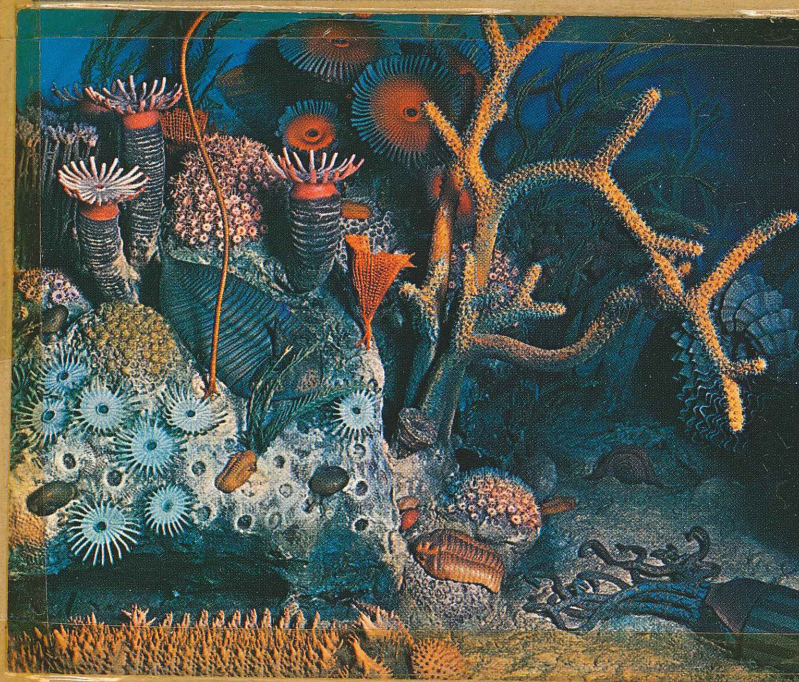

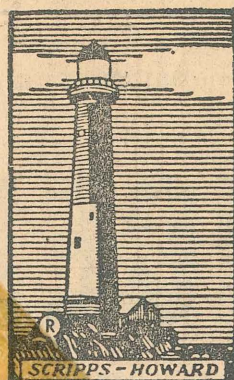

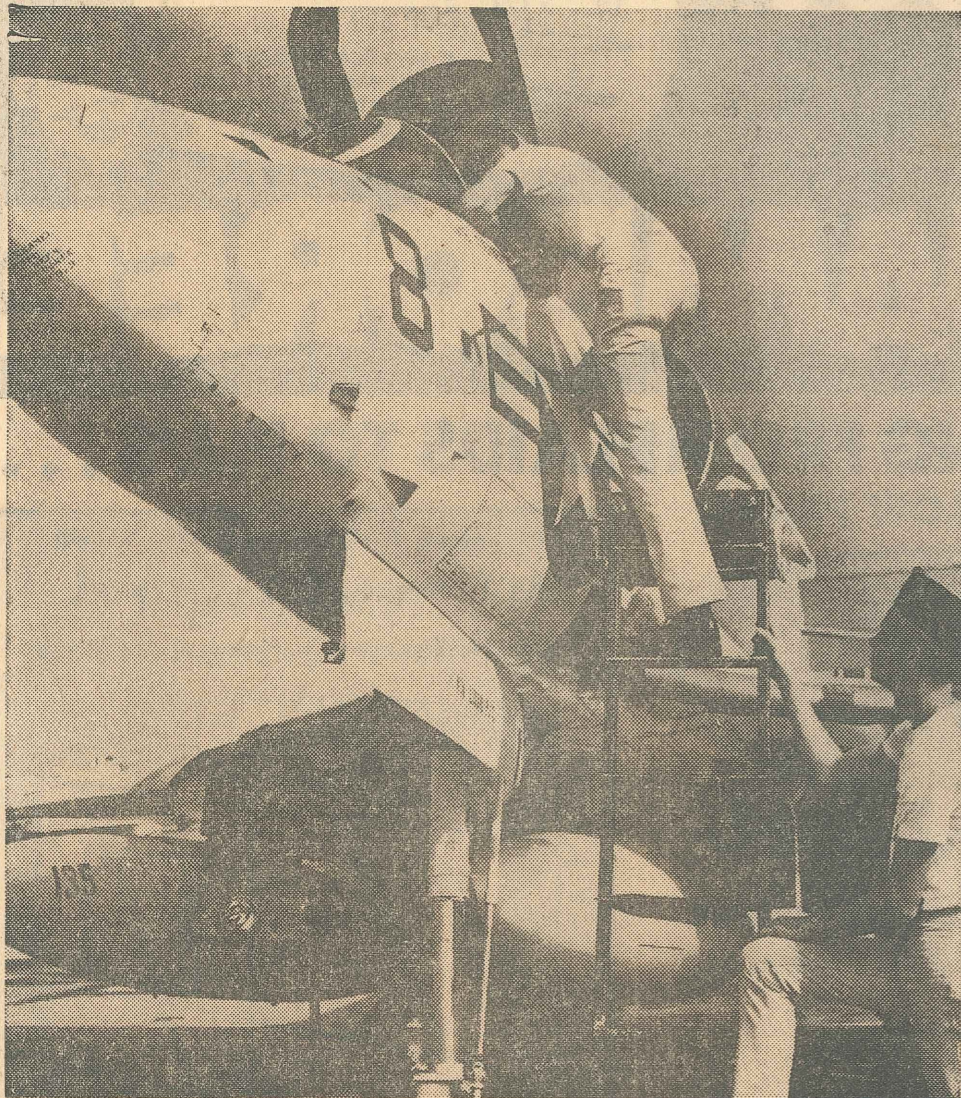

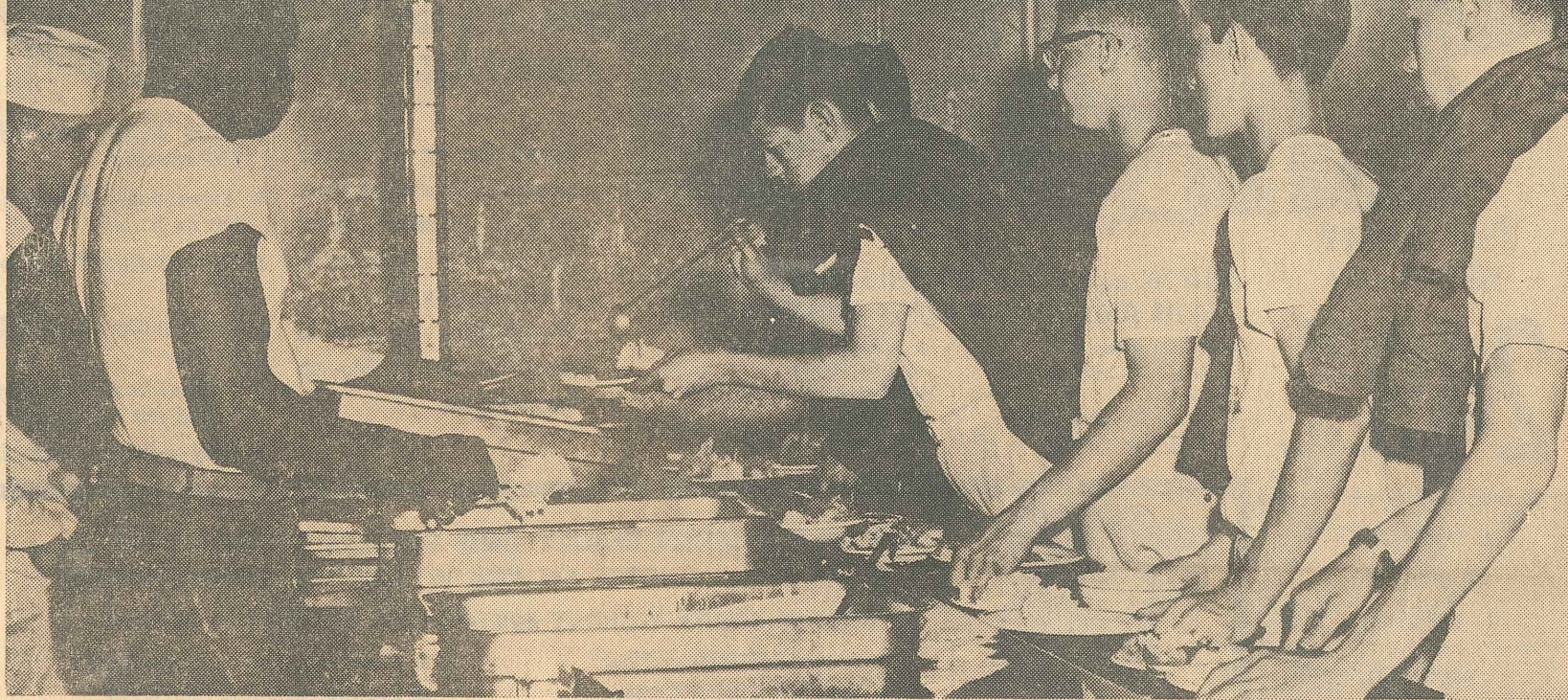

Many of the explorer scouts will recall their experience tonight with other Boy Scouts and their families when films of the visit are shown at Halle's auditorium.

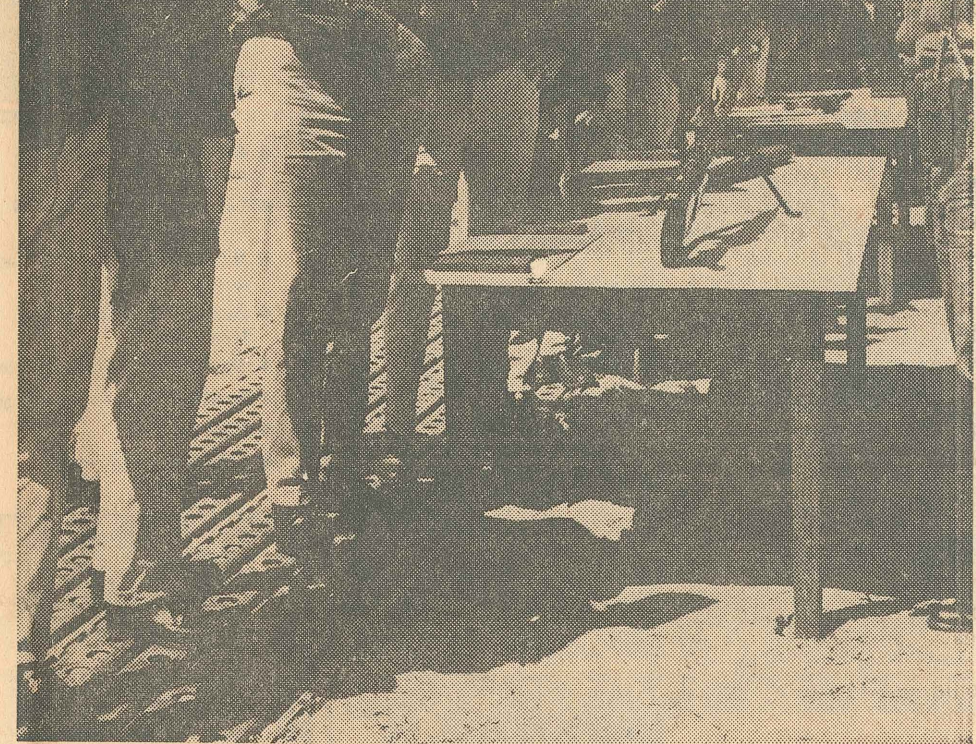


WIND-SWEPT SCOUTS hang on to their hats as a marine rescue helicopter goes through a demonstration.

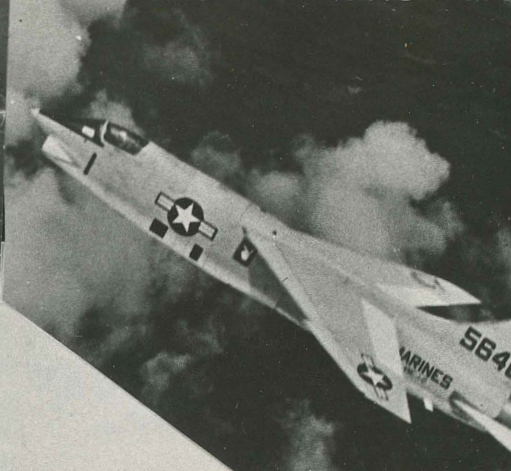

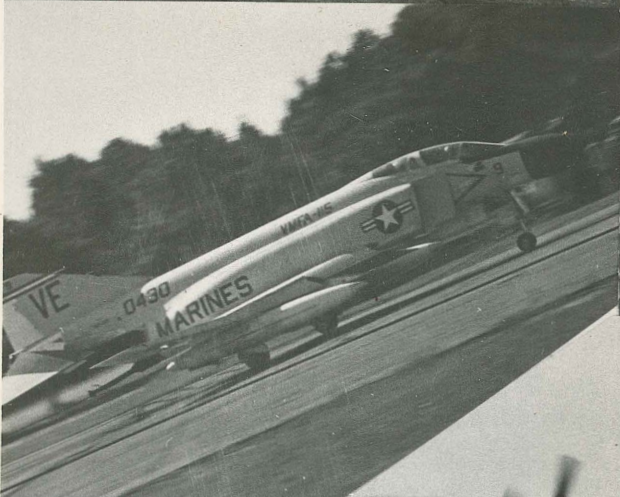

Ohio Explorers Here For Romp & Stomp Corps-Style

Some 180 Explorer Scouts from the greater Cleveland, Ohio area are spending their Easter "vacation" week here getting an insight of Marine Corps life and generally broadening their knowledge.

Traveling at their own expense, the boys, from 15 to 17 years old, arrived at Cherry Point on Easter Sunday by commercial aircraft from Cleveland.

The Cleveland Explorers form one of the largest and most active scouting units in the country. They visit a major military installation each year, alternating between the Army, Navy, Air Force and Marine Corps.

At their own suggestion, the youngsters are experiencing a 17-hour daily schedule during their six-day stay. They are eating in Marine messhalls, sleeping in barracks, camping out and getting plenty of exercise. All activities are under the supervision of Marine officers and enlisted instructors assigned to oversee the Explorers during their visit.

After their Easter evening arrival and a welcome by BrigGen. Norman J. Anderson, Air Station Commander, the boys were formed into three platoons and assigned to a barracks. One Marine officer and non-commissioned officer then took charge of each platoon.

On Monday morning, the youngsters began their routine by "hitting the deck" at 5:30. By 5:45 they had their bunks made and were outside for 15 minutes of invigorating exercise.

Following breakfast, the boys began to see and experience the life of a Marine.

First on their schedule was a visit to Camp Lejeune. Here they inspected a vast array of weapons and equipment used by a Marine infantry division. They also ob-

a split-second teamwork... ing jets giving close air support... Marine infantrymen. They the journeyed by bus to Bogue Field, where they witnessed high performance takeoffs and landings by supersonic jets at the 2d Wing's Short Airfield for Tactical Support (SATS) site.

Monday night was spent under the stars in tents during an overnight bivouac. The Explorers had hot food brought out to their field camp.

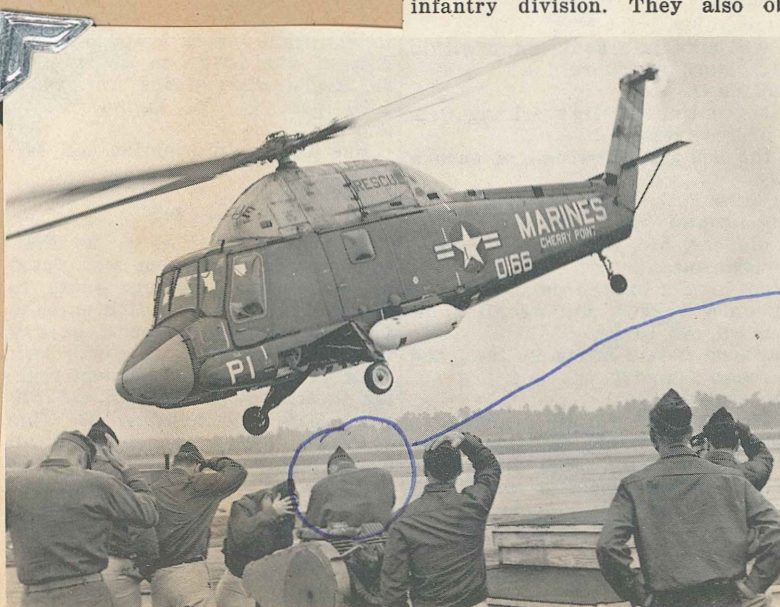
The next day the boys watched a Marine Search and Rescue helicopter perform a simulated rescue mission. In the afternoon they traveled by bus to historic Fort Macon where they toured the Civil War fort and went sightseeing. That evening, a little leisure time was afforded the explorers when they attended a movie at the Station theatre.

On Wednesday morning the boys visited a forestry conservation project and fired the rifle in an afternoon of marksmanship training at the rifle range. The following morning they observed the crash crew extinguish a simulated aircraft fire.

With their visit nearing an end, the boys learned the meaning of a military "field day," as they spent two hours giving their barracks a thorough cleaning this morning. In the afternoon they toured the flight line where various types of Marine Corps aircraft were on static display. Tonight, they will attend an "Explorers Ball" at the officers club.

On Saturday morning the Explorers will be inspected, attend lectures by the Air Station chaplain and their supervisory officers, and prepare for their return to Cleveland.

Cherry Point To Play Host To 700 Weekend Visitors

Cherry Point Marines will host nearly 700 visitors over the Easter weekend, affording them close insight into Leatherneck air operations as well as station orientation.

Saturday, will see the arrival of 280 Marine officer candidates from MCS, Quantico aboard for a one-day orientation tour here. The future Marine leaders will observe Wing units conducting Short Airfield for Tactical Support (SATS) training at Bogue Field before returning to MCS.

Also arriving at Cherry Point on Saturday are 183 Explorer Scouts from the greater Cleveland, Ohio, area, who will visit the station for six days while being escorted by officers and non-commissioned officers assigned them.

Ranging in age from 15 to 17 years, the Explorers are financing their own transportation. Their unit is reputed to be one of the most active in the United States.

Each year the Cleveland Explorer Scouts visit a major military installation. During their visit to Cherry Point, the lads will live in Marine barracks, eat in messhalls, conduct marksmanship training, participate in an overnight bivouac, and perform rigorous early-morning exercises.

On Sunday, the Commandant of the Canadian Army Staff College, Brigadier D. C. Cameron, and 100 of his staff and students are scheduled to visit the Air Station, observing Air Station operations here and at Bogue Field. They will witness SATS training at Bogue as well as close air support missions flown by 2d Wing pilots. The Canadian officers will leave Cherry Point on Monday.

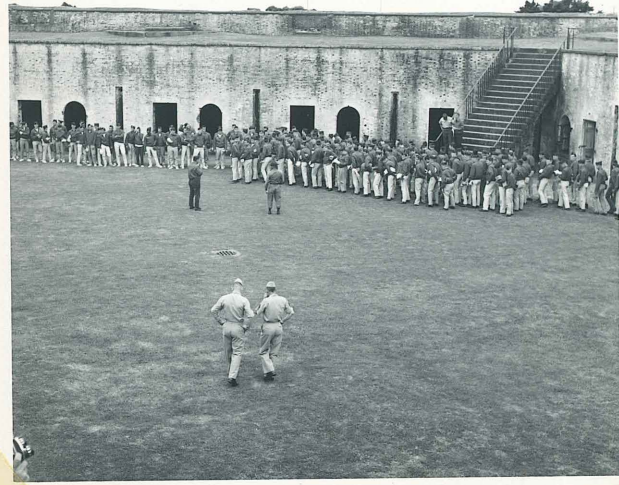

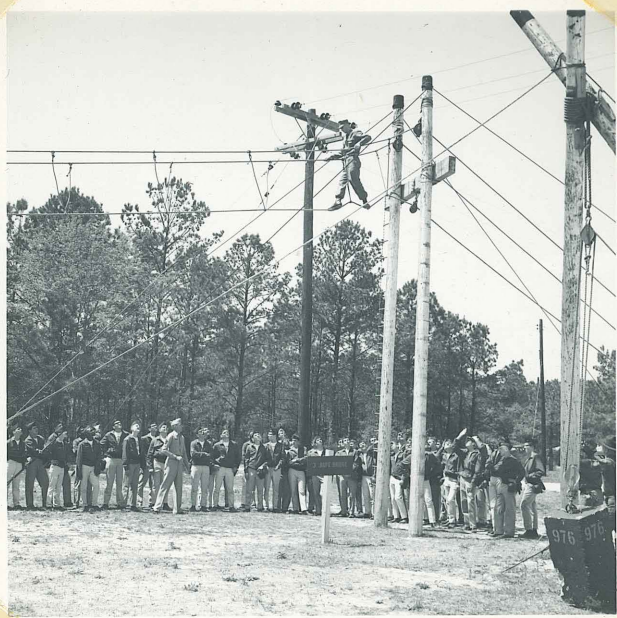
