the said *Violet Moore* was duly appointed as *Teacher* in
Teacher Principal Supervisor

the public schools of said *Helen* district for the term of *8* months beginning on the *6th* day of

September, 192*6*, at a salary of *Sixty Five* Dollars (\$*65.00*) per month;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing action of the Party of the First Part and the further payment of the said monthly salary in the manner prescribed by law the Party of the Second Part agrees to faithfully perform all the duties of said position and to observe and enforce the rules and regulations lawfully prescribed by legally constituted school authorities in so far as they may apply to this District.

It is further agreed by the parties to this contract that the services to be performed shall begin on the date specified and shall be continuous in time except as provided by section 57 of the School Code, provided that any school may be recessed at such time and for such periods as both parties may mutually agree upon from time to time; and, provided further, that should school be closed temporarily for necessary repairs or because of the destruction of the building in which school is conducted, school shall be suspended accordingly until necessary quarters are provided, but the suspension necessitated shall not in any way abrogate the term period of this contract; quarters shall be provided without unnecessary delay and, in any event, in time to complete the school term within the instant school year.

It is further agreed that the salary for the last month's services to be rendered under this contract shall not be paid until all reports have been made and duties performed for the term of the contract by the Party of the Second Part.

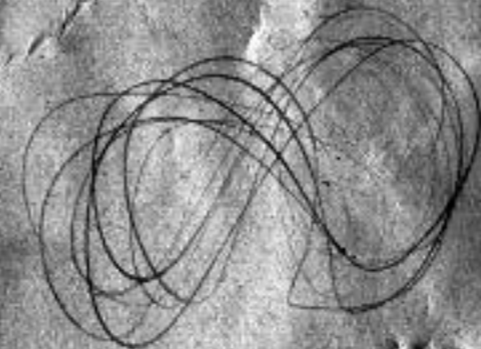


I received your money and immediately got in touch with the authorities and had the charges and prosecution dismissed against your son, and took up the checks in the case. I also took care of your son on the charge in the City Court, and he is now free from all charges.

However, the garage where his car is held has a bill of \$17.00 for garage storage against him which must be paid before he can have his car released, and as for my fee, if the note is signed I will release it as far as I am concerned. ing Corn until my hands are a bout worn
out. I suppose that I am half done.
My Corn yields a bout fifty bushels
per Acre, I will have only five Hogs to
winter over unless I can buy, and that
will be rather a hard thing to do. Hogs
are scarce and the amount of stock
Hogs are selling from 10 to 15 ^{cts} gross.
While Corn is plenty and finds a market
at 25 ^{cts}, but we can do better selling
Corn at 25 than you can at 50, it is
such easy work to tend it. Cattle
are plenty and selling at high figures.
Work Cattle are selling very high; I
was offered a yoke of Steers, two years
old, last Spring for \$60, if they had
have been met and suitable Cattle I should
have taken them. Horses also up in
the prices, anything that will work
is in demand, for all almost every
kind of work is done by mule and
it requires a team to draw it

There has been some Aque this, owing to the
wet season, I have had a little jerk of it but none
to do any good, My family have had excellent health
all we need to complain of is hard work and being
down, worn down

I wish that you would, see Genry Messenger and
see if he has done anything with the Jonathan Berry
now, if you have any chance to get any thing
from him, get it if possible, take it in any
thing that you can, ^{that} any money of, of course I
wish you & Genry to pay your debts for your won-
ble, I have regarded it doubtful, but perhaps there
